Postal Context

Kibwezi, Uganda Railway mile 197, was an early Scottish mission station with a runner service from before 1895. A District Collector was stationed here for a few months in 1900 before blackwater fever caused the move to Makindu in October.

Inward Underpaid Mail - Surcharge Notice

Shown is an EAP&T 'P.5' form that has been issued in respect of an incoming 'understamped postal article'. This notice would have been placed in the addressee's post box, as mail was not delivered in East Africa but had to be collected from the Post Office. In this case, the correct postal regulations, as directed by the text (shown below on a digital scan), have not been followed, since the postage due stamps, for the surcharge amount of 2s50c, should have been on the underpaid item. These have, instead, been affixed to the back of the notice and have been cancelled at KIKUYU on 28 March 61.

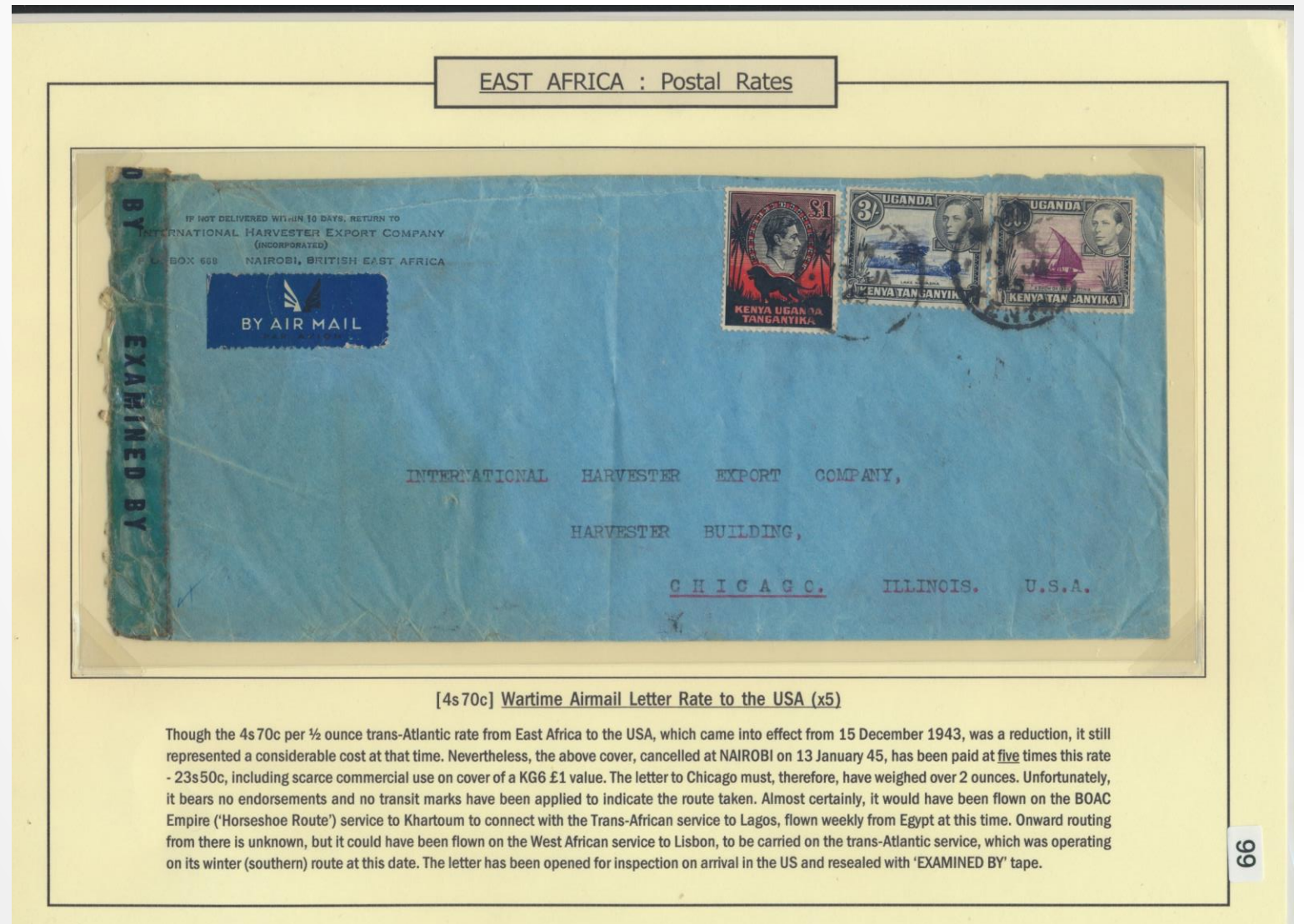

EAST AFRICA : Postal Rates



[1/4 & 1a] Newspaper Wrappers / Printed - Paper Rate

From the very start of a postal service in East Africa in 1890, a reduced rate for 'Printed Papers' was available and, in 1896, wrappers became available for sending newspapers. These were pre-printed on buff paper, in two values - 1/4a green & 1a carmine. The rate was the same for all destinations worldwide - but an anna for each 2 ounces, so presumably the 1a version was intended to cater for heavier publications. Examples of both these BRITISH EAST AFRICA versions are shown. Though both appear to have been used, neither has been addressed, so they seem to have been cancelled by hand at MOMBASA on 18 October 97. The 1/4a printed-paper rate remained in effect until the change of currency that took place on 1 April 1907, when the rate became an equivalent 3c per 2oz.



EAST AFRICA : Postal Rates



[2 1/2a] Letter Rate / Postal Stationery

When a postal service became available in East Africa in 1890, the postal rates that applied in India were used. Initially, the letter rate was 4/4 annas per ounce but the Indian rate was reduced to 2 1/2a on 1 January 1893 and East Africa came into line with this shortly after. The rate is illustrated by items of BRITISH EAST AFRICA pre-printed postal stationery, which became available in two sizes in 1896. Above, cancelled at MOMBASA on 18 October 97, and below, on 4 November 98, the latter item has taken 24 days in transit to KING'S LYNN, where it has been received on 28 November. At this time, the same rate applied for all destinations and it was not until after the adoption of the 'Imperial Penny Post', on 25 December 1898, that any differentiation between individual countries was made.

[1a] Surface Letter Rate to the UK / [2a] Registration Fee

Initially, East Africa used the same postal rates as those applied in India but when it signed up to the Imperial postal agreement of 25 December 1898, the Empire letter rate became 1 anna per ounce. The original rate had been 2 1/2a and the cover shown is an item of BRITISH EAST AFRICA postal stationery pre-printed at this rate. The article has, however, been registered, for which the fee was 2a, so it has been updated by 1/4a to make up the 1a rate, plus registration. It has been cancelled at MOMBASA on 28 July 02 and has been received at OLDHAM on 20 August - a transit time of 23 days.

[6c] Inland Letter Rate

On 1 October 1907, when a currency based on cents instead of annas was adopted, the rate for letters addressed within East Africa became 6c per ounce. In fact, this rate was also the same for British Empire destinations. Examples of EAST AFRICA AND UGANDA PROTECTED STATES postal stationery, pre-printed for this 6c rate, are shown - above, a KEVII version cancelled at KAMPALA on 11 November 08 and below, a KUVI version cancelled at HOMA on 5 April 13. The 6c rate remained in effect until another change to the currency was made on 1 January 1922.

[10c] Surface Letter Rate to the UK - Double & Triple / Provisional Receipt

Following the increase in the rate for Empire destinations, from 6c to 10c per 1/2 ounce, on 1 April 1918, there was a shortage of 10c stamps, so some of the stock of 6c stamps was re-cancelled 'in spirit' at the South Press works in Nairobi. However, the problem does appear to have been anticipated, because these became available on the 7th. Examples are shown on items addressed to the UK - on the right, cancelled at ENTebbe on 14 May 19, below, cancelled on 18 March 20 at NAIROBI. The former has been paid at 20c - double over the letter, part of a cover sheet only, apparently bears a rate of 10c. Since the registration fee was 25c, this appears to have been part of an item paid at 45c rate.

[15c] Surface Letter Rate to Foreign Destinations / [12a] Registration Fee

With effect from 1 October 1907, the letter rate to countries not in the British Empire became 15c for the first ounce and 1c for each additional ounce. Following the conversion of the currency from annas to cents, the cover shown, cancelled at the VICTORIA STREET sub-office in Nairobi on 7 June 13, has been paid at this rate - with the total of 27c made up by the addition of the 12a registration fee that was payable at this time. The letter, which bears an inked seal of the National Bank of India, was NAIROBI on 7 June, received a MOMBASA transit mark on the 10th, arrived in America on 13 July and reached CHICAGO on the 10th - a total journey time of five weeks.

[16c] Letter Rate to the UK - Triple / [17c] Registration Fee

The Indian monetary system was used in the East African territories until 1 October 1907, when a new currency based on cents instead of annas was adopted. At this time, the rate for letters addressed to British Empire destinations, including Britain itself, was changed from 3a per 1/2 ounce to 6c per ounce. The cover shown, addressed to the UK and cancelled at NAIROBI on 5 March 15, has been paid at a total of 30c - which represents triple rate plus the 12c registration fee. This indication that the new weight and 2 annas, which seems a bit far to see - though the cover has been stamped at the top and the additional reinforcement of the flap with black sealing wax does suggest that it may have contained bulky contents. A transit mark has been applied on 6 March at MOMBASA, from where the letter has taken more than 5 weeks to reach the UK. It has been received in LONDON on 12 April and has arrived at ENTebbe the following day, in March 1916. Though the rate remained in force, a change was made so that it now applied to a reduced weight of 1/4 oz.

[6c] Surface Postcard Rate

In 1907, a change of currency from annas to cents took place and, on 1 October, the rate for postcards to other Empire destinations became 6c. Most examples bear the 6c rate stamp issued for the purpose - as illustrated on the above card in Scotland, cancelled at NAIROBI on 28 June 11. However, on the card in England below, written on 5 June 21, the rate has been made up by a three-cent stamp out of six of the 1c value. The 6c rate remained in effect until 1 January 1922, when another currency change was made.

[10c] Surface Letter Rate to the UK

In March 1916, the unit of weight changed from one ounce to half an ounce, though the rate for Empire destinations remained at 6c. However, on 1 April 1918, this rate was increased to 10c per 1/2 ounce and this is illustrated on two examples of EAST AFRICA AND UGANDA PROTECTED STATES postal stationery, both addressed to the UK. The above cover, pre-printed for the 6c rate, has been updated with four 1c stamps and has been cancelled at NAIROBI on 6 May 21. Below is an example of the new pre-printed 10c version, cancelled at NAIROBI on 14 November 21.

[30c] Surface Letter Rate to Foreign Destinations / Commemorative Issue Commercial Usage

From the date of the introduction of new currency, 1 January 1922, until 3 September 1939, when war was declared, the rate for postage of letters to foreign destinations was 30c for the first ounce and 15c for each additional ounce. Any country not within the territory and not a part of the British Empire was defined as "foreign". The above cover of Switzerland, cancelled at KISUMU on 1 January 28, has been paid at the correct 30c rate, but the one below to the USA, cancelled at MOMBASA on 30 October 21, has been paid at only 25c, as it bears a "T" mark for "Canada". It was cancelled at a US Postage Due amount of 7 Cents. Together, these items display commemorative usage of the set of three Commemorative stamps issued on 12 May 1927.

EAST AFRICA : Postal Rates

[40c] Surface Letter Rate to Foreign Destinations

The international rate for letters to foreign destinations was 40c for the first ounce and 20c for each additional ounce. The first ounce between 1 January 1922, when a new system of currency had come into effect, and 1 January 1921, when the rate was increased by 10c. Two covers paid at the rate are shown. Above is a cover to Denmark, cancelled at MOMBASA on 22 March 12; below, a cover to the USA, cancelled at the SALAM ROAD 130 (down sub-office) in Mombasa.

Surface Letter Rate to the USA

On 1 January 1922, when a new currency based on shillings and cents was adopted in East Africa, the surface rate for letters to foreign countries became 25c for the first ounce in weight. The rate remained unchanged for nearly 20 years, when the amount would rise, as it was not until 1 January 1951 that this international postal rate was increased to 40c. Of the two covers shown, the one sent from MOMBASA, only the one above, cancelled on 24 February 38, bears the correct 25c rate. The one below, cancelled on 20 April 51, has been underpaid by 15c—however, the underpayment appears to have gone undetected.

EAST AFRICA : Postal Rates

[145c] Letter Rate to the USA - Part Air & Surface

Prior to the opening of the Postal Route 18 Trans-Atlantic service in mid 1935, there was no air link to North America. Letters could be sent by air to London at a rate of 70c for forwarding to surface, but a route based on 20 January 1935 had a rate, effective from 1 February, that included air carriage within the USA for an additional 65c. This 145c rate, however, seems to have been little used, as there bearing this postal rate are seldom seen. An example of this surface rate is shown as a cover, cancelled at MOMBASA on 25 May 29, addressed to Ohio. It bears a suitable endorsement, "By Air to London and by Air America" (flight received as "in" has been omitted). The rate, used by the East Africa Postal Office, would have been forwarded by air from New York to the West Coast Company's Trip. The Aero Club are not known to have issued any West Africa, but records show that the short land East African Airways service had not then been. Cover from a 1929 West Africa advertisement on show.

EAST AFRICA : Postal Rates

[70c] Letter Rate to Argentina - Part Air & Surface

By the mid 1930s, a postal service was available to most countries. The cost, however, of sending letters all the way air to some more remote places, such as South America, could be considerable. This was because the route taken was via France or Germany, as an Anglo-American service did not become available until 1935. Effective from 1 February 1935, airmail to Argentina cost a massive 80c per 1/2 ounce. The cost could be reduced to 40c if postage was by air to London, to surface across the Atlantic, then by air from the USA. However, since Argentina was in the category of "America and countries served by air", a letter could be sent there at the same 70c Air to London rate, if it was appropriately endorsed. The necessary 70c rate paid on the cover shown, cancelled at MOMBASA on 20 November 28 and endorsed, "Via London Air Mail", is correct. However, and further endorsed by air has been cleared in London by application of a red 2 Star stamp's mark, struck vertically, missing the actual label. Overseas transmission would have been by steamer, probably via New York to BOSTON, where the letter was sent on 11 December, being sent a month to Brazil.

[20c] Inland Letter Rate

On 1 July 1921, the inland letter rate, previously 15c, was increased to 20c for the first ounce. Though the rate reverted back to 15c on 1 January 1922, it rose once more to 20c on the outbreak of war in September 1918. The covers shown, therefore, both pre-printed 20c postal destination items issued for the purpose during the appropriate periods, are examples of the correct inland rate. The upper item has been cancelled at KISUMU on 4 September 28 and the lower one at MOMBASA on 31 October 44. Both origins lie on the Central Railway, as the letters would have reached the post office by rail.

International Printed Paper Rate / UPU Colour Convention - Green

Newsletters or "commemorative papers" could be sent for a reduced amount, known as the "International Printed Paper" rate. To aid postal clerks in countries in the Universal Postal Union, colour conventions had been established and a green stamp was required for each mail. From 1922, the rate had been set at 5c, for qualifying mail to be 5 ounces in weight irrespective of destination, but this was increased to 10c on 1 January 1927. This forced a colour change and the 5c & 10c stamps exchanged colours, but these were not issued until 1 June 1928. An example of the 10c green in issue is shown on a cover to India, cancelled at MOMBASA on 11 July 20. However, on 1 January 1925, the rate increased again, as the 10c value, previously red, had to be changed to green. An example of the new 10c stamp, issued on 1 April 1922, is shown on a cover to Germany, cancelled at MOMBASA on 8 December 23.

EAST AFRICA : Postal Rates

[20c] Surface Letter Rate to the UK / Royal Silver Wedding Issue - Commemorative Usage

When war began in September 1918, causing suspension of the Empire "all-ign" service, surface rates were introduced for the duration of the war. The value rate for Empire countries, including the UK, was 20c for the first ounce and 10c for each additional ounce. Post-war, when the above cover was cancelled at MOMBASA on 18 December 48, the rate was still in effect and has been paid by commemorative use of the 20c value from the pair of commemorations that had been issued on 1 December for the Silver Wedding of King George. The Union Castle Line held the surface mail contract and the postmark below shows a Royal Mail and passenger ship (part of the fleet operated by the company on the route. Postmark Castle, which was built at the Harford & Wolff yard in Belfast, was launched on 19 August 1947 and entered service during 1948.

Airmail Letter Rate to West Africa - Overnight / Sent by Surface

From early in 1947, airmail rates to Empire destinations began to be reduced slightly from the surface rate to 1/2 70c. By the time the above cover was sent from MOMBASA on 8 December 52, the rates for countries within Africa were 80c or 1s, depending on distance, as the rate paid appears to be correct for the Gold Coast. Nevertheless, the article has been interpreted as, as there is evidence that it contained bulky contents. It was almost certainly therefore a registered item that the 1/2 70c value. However, it bears no indication of such—the only endorsement being a double application of an "INSUFFICIENT PRE-PAID FOR AIR MAIL CONVERTED TO SURFACE MAIL" instruction.

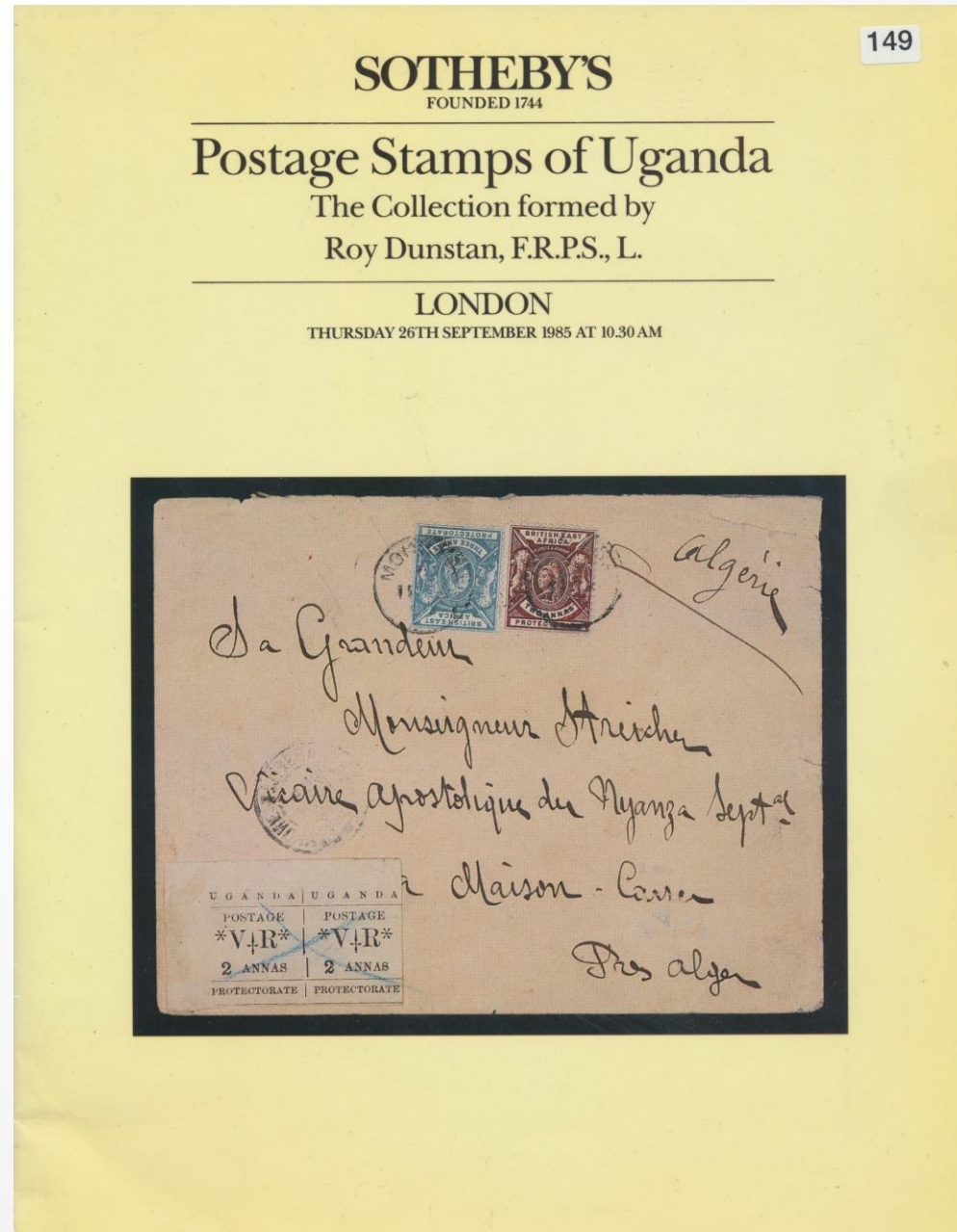

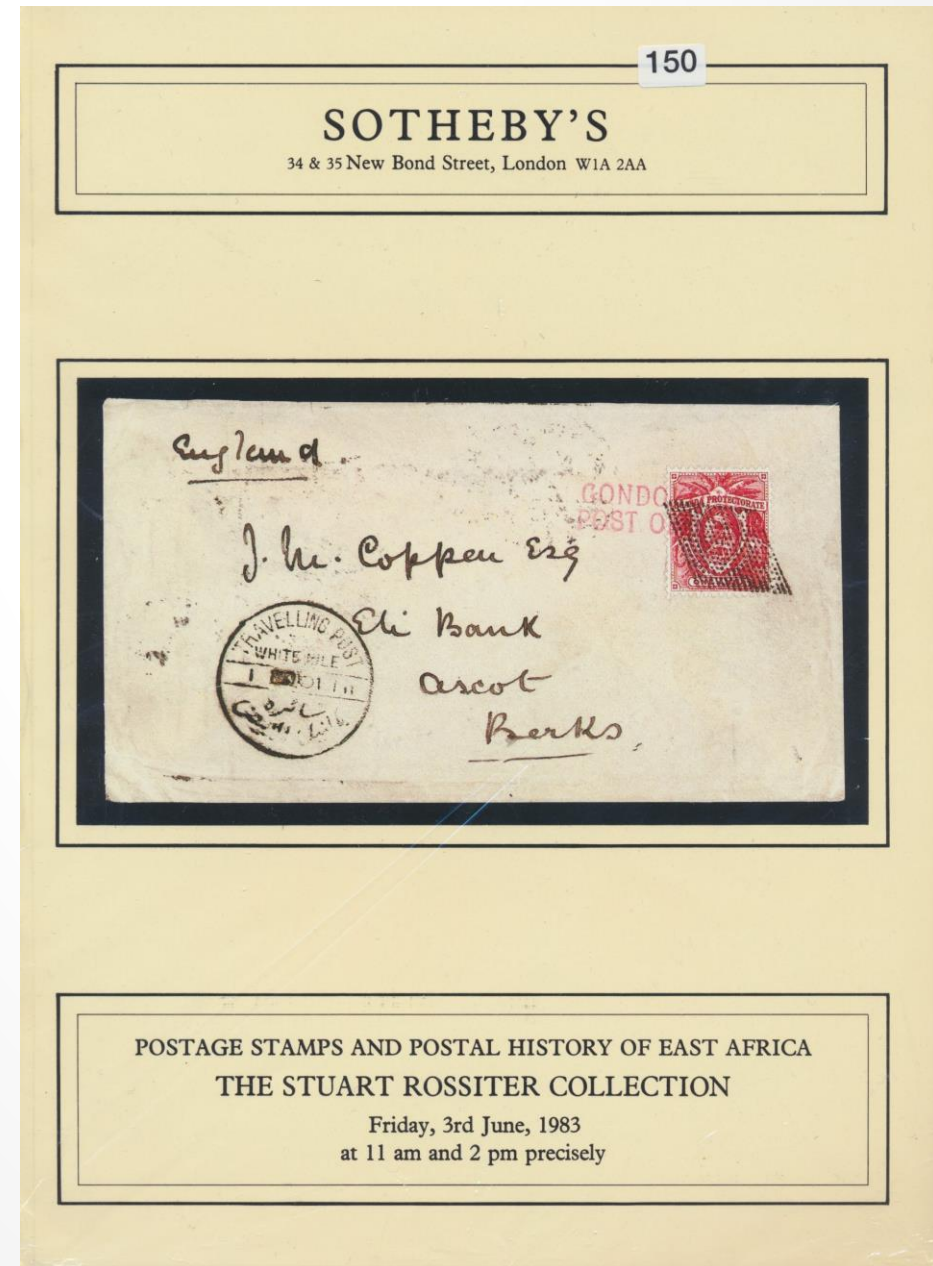
